SPFAS RENOVATIONS CAPITAL PROJECT


The SPFAS's major scope \$2.8 M Main Facility Sustainability Renovations Capital Project (being carried out by Chandos Construction), is progressing on schedule and as planned. When complete it will include:

- Replacement of the Red Dutton Arena's Concrete Floor Pad, along with the installation of a heat protective liner, so Ice can be kept in great shape and used all year round.
- Upgraded Red Dutton Arena Spectators Seating Area, including adding wheelchair access
- Reconfiguring and enhancement of the Concession and Curling Rink entry areas, including installing new barrier free wheelchair accessible washrooms
- Addition of a new "link to technology " Work and Study Space
- Installation of a new Elevator to service all levels of SPFAS Main Facility

Work is geared to have most renovations completed by late August / early Sept, and it will definitely add to the facility and it's all seasons activities vision.







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HI FROM THE NEW SPFAS GENERAL MANAGER



Dear Members & SPFAS patrons.

It was with pleasure I joined the Team April 13th, and appreciated the warm welcome I received from everyone. As I mentioned at my 1st SPFAS May 17th Board meeting, I tried to get up to speed asap, as well as connect with lots of people, including the leads working on

our SPFAS's big construction / renovations project.

As you will see and read more about on this month's Newsletter's cover, the Red Dutton arena has had its old cement pad removed and been stripped right down underneath. It's getting an all-new drainage / moisture control weeping tile system installed, a new sump pit, an Elevator housing structure on its SW end, new accessible bleachers & as mentioned an insulated ground covering heat liner (to assist with being able to keep the ice year-round).

The new facility Elevator, will provide easier access to the two skating rinks and drop people off right at our Lounge (which is getting a rejuvenating overall service upgrade, including barrier free/wheel chair accessible new washrooms, etc.). We are also excited to offer members a "new link to technology" work & study space - as you are coming into the reconfigured concession area. Stay tuned for more details on any grand opening planning to kick these nice new facility features off.

It was great to hear that June 1/21 our SPFAS outdoor facilities can open back up, for physical, performance, recreation and social gatherings - of up to 10 people. Then by hopefully mid-June, that's expanding to 20 people, and Indoor Recreation is allowed again with 30% code occupancy; plus youth and adult sports resume with no restrictions! Early July is now the forecasted

date for All restrictions being possibly lifted, and it will be exciting to see the facility busier again. Keep an eye on our www.springbankpark.com website for additional details.

Please feel free to say Hi if we are passing in the Hallways, outside the Arenas, in the new improved Lounge come Sept, etc. Here's wishing you all an enjoyable less restricted summer season.

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
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TRIBUTE TO ERIC LONGEWAY (LIFETIME SPFAS MEMBER)

Hard to believe we are in the last month school. Middle and High Schools are planning their end of year celebrations. Once again, there will be no traditional ceremonies, which presents a loss to students as these are earned rites of passage

events. School staff and parents are working creatively to rise to the occasion and despite all the restrictions make this year's graduation as wonderful as possible.

The past month has been a busy time for the Board of Trustees. It is budget time which requires focusing on what is most important in our system and then prioritizing dollars to those areas, while maintaining services that keep the system running. In addition to establishing this year's budget, the Board has been engaged in a school closure process with Prince of Peace school. The Board submitted its capital plan highlighting the expansion needs of Bow Valley High School as its number one priority. The Board is awaiting news on its request for 31 new portables. The Board has revised Policy 1 which is the Foundation Statements. These statements reflect the vision, purpose, and values of the district.

The weekend of April 23-25, I and six members of the Ward 5 School Councils attended the Alberta School Councils Association Conference. The opening speaker was Minister Andriana LaGrange. The plenary session on Saturday was given by the students at Lacombe Composite High School. The students provided an overview of the Eco Vision Program. The following outcomes were reported:

- Bee keeping business
- Geodesic greenhouse supplying produce
- Three aquaponics strategies showing differing results
- Partnerships with Alberta Agriculture, Native community, and community business
- Did a recycle project
- 15 major environmental projects

- Agricultural leaders in the province
- Has had multiple awards
- Has had community impact
- Sell their products at the farmer's market
- Youth environmental grant by Alberta Emerald Foundation

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Alberta is reopening - wide open, and once and for all!

A short year and a half ago we embarked optimistically into our new decade with unbounded confidence towards our province's economy and way of life, only to fall victim not long thereafter to a virus and the whims

of governments trying their best to slow its spread. Fast forward fifteen months and there isn't a single one of us who has not been impacted in some way by public health restrictions, whether that be through the inability to visit our loved ones, the financial stress of making mortgage payments while running a small business that has been forced shut, the exhaustion from home schooling our children, or the longing for a return to normalcy.

Since day one I have been critical of province-wide restrictions in all jurisdictions that implemented them, and have consistently advocated for the restoration of economic and personal freedom in our province. I've written editorials in our local paper, spoken in the legislature, and even gone so far as to sign a public declaration with numerous other MLAs denouncing my own government's decision to move backwards at one point. I believe in self-determination, not the heavy hand of government. I believe that Albertans are responsible people who deserve to be the makers of their own destiny, and that Albertans are capable of making their own personal choices in the best interest of their friends, families, and neighbours. And based on the thousands - literally - of emails and phone calls I've received to my office, I know that those of you living in our community believe these things too.

The Merriam-Webster Medical Dictionary defines health care as "efforts made to maintain or restore physical, mental or emotional well-being". Similarly, the World Health Organization's Constitution, itself, defines health as "a state of complete physical, mental and social well-being and not merely the absence of disease or infirmity."

The COVID 19 virus is real, and has had serious effects on select members of our population. Yet for too long we have treated this virus in isolation rather than as a part of our greater healthcare system. Health restrictions designed to protect our physical health have had inverse effects on other areas of our health. As a society, we may never fully realize the depression, social anxiety, and addiction that propagate as a result of such longstanding and broad sweeping restrictions, but we still have time to course correct.

That is why I am so thrilled that our Government has presented a final plan to fully reopen our province – quickly, and once and for all. By July, Alberta will not only the most open jurisdiction in all of Canada, but in most of North America and the entire world. Alberta's plan is based on a combination of vaccination rates and hospitalizations, broken down into three stages with a two-week buffer between each stage. By the time you are reading this, we will already be in stage one and will have met the threshold to advance to stage two.

In this second stage which is likely to commence mid-June, restaurants will open for indoor dining and not be required to limit their patrons to members of the same household. Retail and worship services may increase their capacity to one-third of their fire code, gyms and indoor fitness classes may reopen with minor distancing requirements, youth and adult sports will resume without restriction, outdoor fixed seating facilities such as grandstands and sporting arenas may also reopen with one-third of seated capacity, and outdoor gatherings of up to 150 people may take place.

If our vaccination rate continues on the trajectory it is currently on, we will break through to stage three by late June or early July, at which point every public health restriction in the province will be removed. No more mandatory masking, no more social distancing, and no more limitations on living our lives to the fullest, freest extent. We will have a Calgary Stampede, we will have a CFL season, and we will throw home dinner parties again.

Fifteen months of restrictions on our lives, businesses, and communities has felt like an eternity, and there have undoubtedly been days when we felt as though there were no end in sight, but we are Albertans. We are a self-determinant people and facing adversity with confidence has always been in our DNA. No handout or government support can supplement a life, dream or livelihood lost, and prolonged, mass shutdowns have never been the solution. Embracing the true Albertan inside each of us and taking a confident, diligent and optimistic step forward into our future as a province is, and we are about to do just that.

It is time that we relinquish our fears to a common belief that the best is yet to come. Together, we can not only take charge of our own destinies again, but we can pave a way for the rest of the world to see that life safely can, and must go on from here.

COCHRANE FOOTHILLS PROTECTIVE ASSOCIATION (CFPA) — THE RURAL CRIME WATCH ASSOCIATION FOR SPRINGBANK



Cochrane Foothills Protective Association (CFPA) is the Rural Crime Watch Association for the Cochrane and west Airdrie RCMP Detachment jurisdictions, including the Bragg Creek and Springbank areas of Rocky View County.

RAPID Response program initiated

On April 1st, 140 fish and wildlife officers across Alberta become part of a new RAPID Response initiative to combat rural crime and protect Albertans. Under RAPID Response, Alberta's Fish and Wildlife Officers are now available to help Alberta's RCMP answer emergency and high-priority calls when requested. This means fish and wildlife officers are now able to respond to requests from the RCMP to be first at the scene of an emergency in cases where they are closer than the police. Fish and wildlife officers will also respond to RCMP requests for backup, which could involve helping the police locate suspects or preserve a crime scene.

RAPID Response is a new function for fish and wildlife officers. The core mandate of Fish and Wildlife Enforcement Services remains conservation law enforcement. Most days, fish and wildlife officers will spend their time solely on their regular duties.

RAPID Response currently covers most areas of rural Alberta policed by the RCMP. The provincial government is also holding a series of meetings with First Nations and Métis leaders to determine their interest and earn their support before expanding RAPID Response to their communities.

June is commercial vehicle safety, along with a focus on cycling, construction zones, off-highway vehicles and fatigue. All important aspects of the Traffic Safety Aspect.

Off highway-vehicles can be fun for everyone. Anywhere in Alberta, you cannot drive an OHV when impaired or drive it dangerously. In Alberta, an off-highway vehicle (OHV) is defined in the Traffic Safety Act as any motorized mode of transportation built for cross-country travel on land, snow, ice or marsh or swamp land or on other natural terrain, and without limiting the generality of the foregoing, includes, when specifically designed for such travel: 4 wheel drive vehicles, two wheel vehicles, ATV's, snow vehicles, minibikes, and any other means of motorized transportation. This definition includes OHV's known as side by sides, dirt bikes, snowmobiles and snow bikes. You need to wear a helmet while riding

an OHV, unless on private property with permission of the owner, or on your own property. There are other exemptions, but they can be found at www.transportation.alberta.ca.

Each year in Alberta, dozens of workers and motorists are injured or killed in construction zones. A lot of these collisions are completely preventable by slowing down and being more attentive. About 900 collisions, some with injuries or fatalities occur every year in road and utility construction zones in Alberta. So, please be patient and give yourself lots of time while

travelling in the spring/summer around Alberta.

In today's busy world, people are not getting enough sleep. If sleep deprivation only meant longer lines at the coffee shop, that would be great! Unfortunately, fatigue has serious consequences when it comes to road safety. The amount of sleep you get can greatly impact your risk of getting into a crash. Symptoms of fatigue are driving too fast or too slow, trouble focusing and losing your concentration, memory lapses, a drifting in your lane. Also signs that someone is impaired by drug or alcohol.


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
