WATCH FOR WALKERS DURING THE 10TH ANNUAL KIDNEY MARCH: SEPTEMBER 6TH – 8TH

The Kidney Foundation is hosting its 10th annual Kidney March from September 6 through September 8, 2019. Kidney March registrations and fundraising are at a record high, with over 600 Marchers and Crew Members embarking on the 100 KM trail from Kananaskis to Calgary, with a goal to raise over \$1 million. The journey will begin at the Millarville Race Track on Friday, September 6 and it will go through the Springbank Community and end at Canada Olympic Park on Sunday, September 8.

This transformational weekend is designed to raise awareness and funds for kidney disease prevention, life-saving research, patient programs and organ donation initiatives. One in ten Canadians have kidney disease. The number of Canadians living with end-stage kidney disease has grown 36% since 2007. Each day 15 Canadians learn their kidneys have failed. Thanks to the determination of dedicated Kidney Marchers and Crew Members for nine consecutive years, Kidney March has raised over \$7 million to reduce these numbers.

Kidney March is made up of everyday individuals doing the extraordinary. Families, friends, patients, doctors, nurses walk side-by-side to fight kidney disease and support organ donation. The heroic event is more than a fundraiser. It also supports a community of those affected by the disease.

Kidney March will be walking through the Springbank community on September 8. Please be cautious of Marchers on the roads, look out for the Kidney March signs and feel free to cheer them on! The Springbank Park For All Seasons is serving as a rest stop for our Marchers.

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
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Leading by Example

Our Government
recently passed the
100-day mark of taking
office, and while we have

swearing-in, we still have
a lot of work to do. The

next 100 days, and the rest of the days granted to us by the votes of Albertans, will no doubt include many unique challenges.

You have all undoubtedly felt the consequences of the last government's poor economic and financial stewardship. That is why, on April 16, the largest democratic mandate in Alberta's history was given to us by you- everyday, hard working Albertans. I hope everyone has had a great summer and is looking forward to fall time activities. Of course, the main one that I look forward to is seeing you at the Springbank Fall Fair. Rocky View County has a booth with all sorts of information, Staff and Councillors. Please do stop by and say hi. Last year we

had a great draw for a chainsaw. This year's draw will be a surprise, so be sure to come check it out.

One question I get asked frequently is about development happening in an area. In many instances, the first someone might hear of something is when they receive a notice from the County. While I might prefer and encourage a developer, or a neighbour in some cases, to talk to surrounding residents first (i.e. via flyer distribution, holding an open house, door to door visits), there is no requirement for them to do so.

As well, long before a notice is sent out, an application has generally been with County for quite some time. The Planning Department works with an applicant on the requirements before a notification is sent out.

Once the file is ready, then a notice is sent out to a predetermined area. This notification distribution is completed in compliance with Council's Policy C-327 (<https://www.rockyview.ca/Portals/0/Files/Government/Policies/Policy-C-327.pdf>), which determines which areas will receive notices. For most developments the radius is ½ mile, but for commercial types it is 1 mile. Notices go out when files are ready. There is no attempt by Administration, nor any control exercised by developers, to send out notices during the summer or when people might be away. Rocky View County works 12 months a year, just like most other businesses, so work will continue even during the summer.

Once a notice is received, then there is a comment period, which is usually a couple of weeks. Anyone can provide comments, even those outside a notice zone. As well, once a date is set for Council to hear the application, anyone can come and speak for or against it. Again, there is no intent to reduce or restrict this by Administration or any County policy. Public hearing notifica-

tions are advertised twice in the Rocky View Weekly and are posted on the County's website (www.rockyview.ca).

How do you stay involved? Review the County's website, as upcoming public meetings are advertised there. Springbank is a large geographical area, so focus on items mainly in Divisions 2 & 3. Division 1 has some areas west of Range Road 40 as well. Read the Rocky View Weekly. If you don't receive it in the mail, then read it online and scan the County's advertisements. If your Division's Councillor has a newsletter or facebook page, sign up and join as often there is relevant information there. The Springbank Community Association also has a Facebook page and newsletter, so this is another good source of accurate information.

Also, if you receive a notice from the County, you can email the planner, or even better contact the developer directly to ask when an open house will be hosted, or if other meetings can be arranged. This is especially true if something larger is planned and you are aware there has been no communication.

There are also private websites, including www.myspringbank.ca and www.springbankcommunity.com that contain information about Rocky View County. The County has no control over their content, nor does the County advertise on these, or other private websites, so don't rely on them for up-to-date County information. That said though, if you think other websites should have some local area content, then I encourage you to reach out to directly to their representatives.

Sometimes staying informed and involved takes a bit of work, but usually it is very worthwhile. As always, for those in Division 2, send me an email anytime at kmckylor@rockyview.ca if you are looking for information. I'll try to help out! In the meantime, enjoy the last days of the summer and I'll see you at the Fall Fair.

I thought an update on the Calgary Metropolitan Region Board (CMRB) activities the past few months may be of interest to Springbank residents. The CMRB consists of representatives from ten municipalities: Airdrie, Calgary, Chestermere, Cochrane, High River, Foothills County, Okotoks,

Rocky View County (RVC), Strathmore, and Wheatland County. These municipalities are mandated to develop a long term plan for managed, sustainable growth in the Calgary Region. The voting Board members are all the Mayors and Reeves. The CMRB is chaired by Chris Sheard who is employed for this role. The Government of Alberta is also at the table with a non-voting representative from Municipal Affairs.

The CMRB has three Committees: Land Use, Inter-Municipal Servicing, and Governance. Six municipalities send Councillor representatives other than their Mayor or Reeve to serve on these Committees, while Airdrie, Chestermere, Okotoks, and Rocky View carry on with single-person representation.

The voting structure of the CMRB is a supermajority of not fewer than 2/3's (i.e. 70% of the members and 70% of the population are required to approve a resolution). This means that the City of Calgary has to be on-board with any resolution for it to pass due to the population distribution in the region. On the flip side, it also means that the City of Calgary needs at least 6 neighbours to support resolutions that Calgary wants to advance. This proves to be an interesting dynamic where, if the Board follows its mandate then good business can be done, but if everything falls apart, all development will be grandfathered and limited to old and potentially outdated plans, and new development will grind to a halt.

The Board has developed and approved the "Interim Growth Plan" (IGP) and accompanying it is an important document called the "Interim Regional Evaluation Framework" (IREF). So far under the IGP, the Board has received 4 submissions:

- 2019-01 Airdrie: Ironwood Station Neighbourhood Structure Plan (Amendment)
- 2019-02 Wheatland County: West Highway 1 Area Structure Plan (Amendment)
- 2019-03 Rocky View County: Municipal Development Plan (County Plan Amendment)
- 2019-04 City of Calgary: Westview Area Structure Plan.

The 2019-01 Airdrie submission was approved under the IREF, not challenged and came into effect May 3, 2019. The 2019-02 Wheatland County submission was approved under the IREF, not challenged and it became effective August 2, 2019. Rocky View County's 2019-10 submission was approved with advisements under the IREF, but challenged by Calgary and it remains in progress. The City of Calgary's 2019-04 submission was just submitted as of July 30 and is in progress.

RVC's submission includes removing hamlet population-caps county-wide. Calgary's Westview ASP is located just west of Crestmont and is of interest to Springbank residents in particular.

For an example of the typical flavour of a meeting, at the July 4th Inter-Municipal Servicing Committee meeting, the CMRB technical advisory group (TAG) reviewed progress on it's "Logical Extension of Water and Wastewater Servicing" study. In addition, "Natural and Managed Capacity of Water Supply" and "City of Calgary Disaster Risk & Drought" documents were presented back to back, with both topics being very sobering and spurring good discussions.

Work continues on the final CMRB Growth Plan, due in January 2021, but more on that later. Please see www.calgarymetroregion.ca for more details if you are interested.

TJ MILLAR'S JOURNEY FROM SPRINGBANK MINOR HOCKEY PLAYER TO JUNIOR HOCKEY COACH

It's been 7 years since I left the Springbank Community after having graduated from the Springbank Community High School. I have great memories of all of my hockey games and practices held in the Red Dutton and Joe Phillips Arenas, as well as of playing shinny with my friends on the Outdoor Rink at the Springbank Park For All Seasons (SPFAS).

It still feels like "yesterday" every time I come back home to Springbank and SPFAS. I make a point of coming to visit SPFAS to talk to General Manager John Rop, one of my SMHA Bantam coaches. While smooth jazz is playing in the background during our conversations, we catch up with each other in his office, which is filled with lots of old sports stuff. We both really enjoy these times when we talk with each other.

Since leaving Springbank, I've embarked on what one would call a unique journey. I decided I wanted to become a Hockey Coach. Hockey is a huge part of me, right from my early playing days in Springbank on to my teenage

years when I played in Calgary's Northwest Athletic Association. I wanted to be just like the guys who taught me the love for the game while also teaching me great life lessons that were incorporated into their coaching processes. Hockey's funny that way, it's so much more than just a game. It's the friendships and lifelong memories you make that really make it special.

I moved to Vierumäki, Finland at 19 years of age to get my degree in Sports Management. I was fortunate enough to play Junior Hockey there while at the same time I began my coaching career working with various Finnish National Teams, which included players Patrik Laine and Jesse Puljujärvi. After two years in Finland, I returned to North America to become the Video Coach for the Tri-City Americans Team of the Western Hockey League.

I ventured forward to coaching for the Nipawin Hawks of the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League for two seasons. The Hawks captured the SJHL Championship in 2017-2018, an event which followed the highly publicized Humboldt Broncos Hockey Team tragedy that occurred on April 6, 2018 just a 20 minute drive away from our rink as we were preparing to play Game 5 of our Team's play-off series with the Broncos. You can't prepare for anything like that, however having a strong sense of community and family pushed our Hawks Team through right to the very end.



For the 2018-2019 hockey season, I returned to Alberta and am now the Assistant Coach of the Bonnyville Pontiacs of the Alberta Junior Hockey League. I am very much looking forward to once again being an Assistant Coach with the Pontiacs during the upcoming season.

Every chance I have to return to where I've come from, I've shared stories with those in my life who have all helped me get to this point. I appreciate the opportunity to share with the Springbank Community the story of my hockey life journey to date.

I've learned so much about being a Hockey Coach. Coaching is an incredible job. Done right, it constantly provides rewards. To all the coaches out there, keep working and keep leading. Enjoy every second you have with your teams, both on and off the ice. The impacts and influences you have on kids just might last a lifetime.

Keep your stick on the ice! And have fun teaching and playing the game!

SPRINGBANK FIGURE SKATING CLUB

Approximately 40 skaters, from ages 7 – 19, attended this workshop. While the day was both challenging and intense, the skaters also could see the ways in which Kaetlyn let the skaters know how to find joy and love in skating. Self discipline, motivation and emotional outlook are equally important to the physicality and to deal with potential injuries that may occur over the course of one's skating life.

The strength of the Springbank Figure Skating Club is notable, both by the members within the Club and also as the Club's strength is recognized provincially and nationally. The Club continues to excel in the quality of the skaters it develops and supports. This year is no exception. At the Skate Canada Sections Awards Banquet, the following senior skaters were recipients of awards as follows:

- Dawson Nodwell - Recipient of the Toller Cranston Memorial Fund Athlete Award which he received for his exceptional artistry on the ice as shown at Canadian Nationals

- Vienna Nodwell, Mara Will and Katie Burgess - Quad Gold Award recipients from the Alberta Figure Skating Foundation for completing gold levels in all four disciplines (Skills, Freeski, Dance and Interpretive).

We also wish to recognize up and coming Club Member Alexa Afaganis, recipient of the Mary Leggett Award, the Club's highest award. She truly displays her values and commitment to the sport and to others in a manner that reflects those of the Club's founding member, Mary Leggett.

BECOMING A CRIME RESISTANT COMMUNITY

Since the 1850's, sustained migration has continued to increase the population in the rural areas west of Calgary. Many came a generation or more ago, while many of us have come recently. In the past, residents formed a community culture of looking out for each other by the way they interacted amongst themselves, as well as by the way they interacted with visitors they knew as well as with strangers they did not know. Strangers were generally greeted or acknowledged by residents, who in turn shared their experiences of these encounters with their neighbours.

Fast forward to today. Now we shape our rural community. We have more frequent and many different types of suspicious activities happening in our community than occurred in the past. Rural crime is an intermittent threat to our peaceful community. Intruders look for 'opportunities to take'. We cannot change the intruders and their multiple motivations to steal. We do not want walls and armed guards located at our residences. We rely on our own devices and on each other for security. And of course we have access to law enforcement to investigate incidents and arrest people who intrude. We enjoy the rural values of integrity, reliability and cooperation. We as neighbours join together for many purposes, including deterring crime.

Be aware, record details of incidents and report them promptly, whether they occur at our residences or while driving on our roads. These small and sustained efforts increase the security of our neighbours, many of whom we will never meet. We can be part of developing a rural culture where everyone reports suspicious activities. Promptly alert neighbours in your mutual support group of situations and encounters that are suspicious to you. To do this most effectively, be vigilant on an ongoing basis and have a communications plan.

Do prompt reports of suspicious activities really make a difference? The Alberta Police Reports website confirms that the offenders of highest concern are typically on crime sprees that include utilizing organized tactics and identifying specific targets. Timely reports of intrusions lead to arrests being much more likely. Reports of incidents occurring at similar times, in the same general local areas and with comparable vehicle /person descriptions can be matched to other reports that give the police indications of patterns, locations and identities. Many arrests result from the police's review of a series of




similar timely reports received from the general public. When in doubt, report a suspicious activity.

Rural Crime Watch (RCW) is an organization of some 17,000 rural members located throughout Alberta. The Cochrane Foothills Protective Association (website: <https://cfparcw.ca>) covers the rural area west of Calgary. Join your

neighbours to create an even more crime resistant rural community. While at the Springbank Fall Fair on Sept 7, visit the RCW leaders who will be at in information booth.

Through our coordinated efforts, would-be intruders will come to believe that people in our community are informed, prepared and organized. BEWARE!



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Springbank Off-Stream Reservoir (SR1)

- July 16, 2019: The Canadian Environmental Assessment Agency (CEAA) responded to the Alberta Government's submission with a letter outlining its concerns with the submissions, which it deemed incomplete. This is another setback for the project and will require the Alberta Government to resubmit responses. We expect a long period of time to pass before the submission is updated further.
- July 11, 2019: The Tsuut'ina Nation formally opposed SR1 and has asked the Province of Alberta to consider other alternatives.
- June 14, 2019: The Alberta Government held a press conference to announce 8,000 pages of responses have been submitted to Federal regulators to complete the Province's environmental submissions on SR1.
- Our Letter Writing Campaign: We are gathering letters to deliver to the Premier, to our MLA and to the regulators. Sign and send your letter of concern to info@springbankcommunity.com. We will be at the Fall Fair on September 7th, which is the end date for the letter writing campaign. So far, we have over 300 letters signed!

Springbank Area Structure Plan

We submitted comments to the planners at Rocky View County on the latest draft of the Area Structure Plan. Our comments are outlined as follows:

- Our Community aesthetic should be "master-planned" and purposeful, not piecemeal. We need to decide what Springbank will "look like" over the long-run conceptually. This is beautiful, scenic land and should be developed as such (as well as the gateway to and from Calgary). We do not want parts of our community to look like an industrial park. Therefore, we requested:
 - Input on the architectural guidelines, setbacks and signage within the community; Realizing that some commercial/industrial development is inevitable, we expect high standards for these types of developments (i.e. comparable to Quarry Park and Greenwich in Calgary, especially when these areas connect to residential areas).
 - Input on setback and landscaping along roadways and highways (i.e. Valley Ridge's concrete wall vs Crestmont's natural landscaping); We do not want to look like a "Gasoline Alley" or comparable to a CrossIron Mills
 - An active role in the planning for RR 33 to be our central road corridor, including pathways, roundabouts and landscaping.
- We have specific concerns for the large amount of commercial/industrial development zoning along RR 33 north of Highway 1 (both the aesthetics and the accessibility from RR 33). We asked whether this zoning needs to be exclusively commercial/industrial or whether a multi-use (live/work/play) model would be more suitable or whether this decision can wait until the next ASP, which should be within the decade.
- Development can only proceed with adequate and sustainable servicing, particularly for water, wastewater and storm water.

Recreation Updates:

On July 23rd, Rocky View County approved a new recreation organizational structure which will centralize planning of recreation and will enable the County to manage facilities and take a more active role in the provision of recreation across the County. Overall, we are cautiously optimistic about this change, which will be implemented in Quarters 3 & 4 of 2019.

We have completed the financial analysis for a new community centre in Springbank. The amenities studied include an event venue for 150, large gymnasium, practice-size indoor turf, child care, fitness centre and track, family/teen game area and small library. Rocky View County is taking the lead on this project and we remain focused on helping them bring this to reality. Our goal continues to be to provide safe, accessible spaces for

residents of West Rocky View, and in particular, places for our youth to stay active and connected.

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WATCHING A GREAT HORNED OWL FAMILY GROW UP THIS SUMMER



I moved to an acreage in Springbank last year in January. Prior to moving to Springbank, I've always enjoyed bird-watching when I lived on Vancouver Island, where bald eagles reign.

Since moving to Springbank, I enjoyed watching a pair of redtailed hawks who live nearby. I've also enjoyed observing many other species of birds flying around my acreage, including redpolls, gold finches and a flock of Bohemian waxwings.

This Spring at times I'd hear an owl hooting at dusk around my property. I searched my acreage with binoculars and then one day I located an owl. Shortly thereafter, I realized two Great Horned Owls were living on my property. As I walked around my acreage, I located their favourite perches. I usually found the owls by watching the magpies and crows who were harassing them constantly.

What did I find one day under one of the owl perches in my yard? Why, owl pellets of course! When my kids were young, we would buy these from the science store, soak them, then pull them apart and try to identify the creatures inside. I really enjoyed participating in these owl pellet examination great science projects with my kids.



Towards the latter part of June, one day I saw two young owls in my yard. The first one I saw was on the ground, then it climbed into a tree. I wondered if it may have been injured, however it was just beginning to learn how to fly. I saw the second one while I was in my house looking out over the deck. This owl appeared at the edge of the deck holding on to the railing, while trying to balance as it flapped its big wings. This baby was large and light coloured. It was very fluffy and did not have any "horns". It dropped from the deck railing on to the ground a few feet below, then it flapped and hopped around the yard before climbing a tree from where it called out to its sibling who was perched close by. Then I also saw Mom and Dad on the roof of the house. Wow, it was amazing to see all four owls on the same day!

The two adult great horned owls have been great parents to the young ones. Both of the young ones have found their wings and they are fully airborne now. It's been a real treat watching this Great Horned Owl family grow this summer.

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

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
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
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
