

With the onset of 2022, many of us will look back on 2021 as the year we wish never was. Our province and rural communities endured a lot. Soaring viral case numbers and responsive policy decisions strained our healthcare system, business community,

moral convictions, and personal relationships, while drought conditions challenged our farming and ranching operations, thefts and property crimes rose - often inflicted by individuals struggling with unemployment, hopelessness, and substance abuse as a result of pandemic related measures, and the cost of living and heating our homes skyrocketed at a time when many could afford it least. Yet amidst the doomsday headlines and continued uncertainty, much good arose, and I believe that goodness always deserves to be recognized. People banded together for the betterment of their communities, struggling businesses stepped up to help those in even greater need than they, and the smallest of once unappreciated normalities such as eating in restaurants or attending community events brought us exuberant and unexpected joy. If there was anything I learned throughout 2021, it was to never take the people and experiences around me for granted, to appreciate every small moment, and to always remain hopeful and optimistic for the days ahead. It has been an emotional roller coaster for all of us, but I believe it is important to remember 2021 not for all that was bad, but for all that was good that never received the attention it deserved. Alberta's economy is emerging from COVID 19 stronger and more diversified than ever before. After accelerating a reduction in the business tax rate and slashing over 116,000 regulatory barriers to conducting business, corporate revenues are up 52% for the year and are projected to continue rising at 20% year over year. Our government helped usher in billions of dollars of private sector investment in technology, film, solar, wind, geothermal, hydrogen, petrochemical production, and lithium mining - all industries not traditional to our province. Major banks are not only predicting that Alberta will lead the country in GDP growth this year, but we have also been identified as the fastest growing green energy market in Canada, and the fastest growing tech sector in all of North America. All while simultaneously having our best year of oil production on record, as well as record setting commodity and livestock receipts. Our government also passed legislation to support the longevity and competitiveness of our forestry sector by ensuring reliable and sustainable access to timber, security for capital investments, and streamlined processes for tenure agreements, as well as legislation to support our agriculture sector by enabling irrigation districts to borrow funds for large-scale expansions. To couple the latter, we additionally partnered with the Canadian infrastructure Bank and local irrigation districts to expand Alberta's total irrigated acres, which see an average return on investment of 300%, by 200,000 acres across the province. All of this economic activity enabled us to support Alberta's healthcare system amidst the COVID 19 pandemic at the highest level of funding in Alberta history with a one billion dollar increase, while simultaneously reducing our overall provincial deficit by 68%.

Knowing that access to affordable childcare is key to allowing young parents the ability to enter and participate in Alberta's growing economy, our government signed a historic agreement with the federal government to decrease licensed childcare fees by 50% to \$10 a day and create over 42,000 spaces - the majority of which will all be in rural Alberta. Even more exciting, our plan is the only in Canada to include all forms of public and private licensed childcare, including pre-schools, so that all parents could benefit from the program regardless of where or what hours they work. Students gained increased protection through new legislation to require teachers and educational assistants to undergo routine criminal record checks - something they were not previously required to do, and the creation of an expedited termination process for educators convicted of serious offenses under the Criminal Code with an online registry that will make all disciplinary details public to parents.

Alberta was made safer by the establishment of an Alberta Parole Board to end the revolving door on our criminal justice system, and by transforming 911 into a textable service so that those in dangerous domestic disputes, or those in areas with minimal cellular service, can quietly text in a plea for help without needing to make and sustain a phone call. For the first time in history, we eliminated all user fees from public addictions treatment facilities and created 8,000 new treatment, detox, and recovery spaces so that all Albertans, regardless of their socio-economic position, can access the help they need to regain their lives back. ... and the important work began of securing a fair deal for our province from Ottawa with the successful passage of an equalization referendum, the appointment of our first Chief Firearms Officer, and the commissioning of a comprehensive study on the potential for a provincial police force focused on community policing and local priorities. COVID 19 aside, 2021 was actually a pretty successful year for our province. I do still recognize that this past year was one of the most difficult we've faced in a generation. When I go back to Edmonton in February, there are many priorities that still need advancing to support the recovery and vitality of our community. Rural crime is pervasive, a lack of seniors housing continues to drive our elderly out of the community and into the city, timely EMS access must be improved, the Range Road 33 overpass could use improvement, and small businesses need support like never before. Yet I will always believe it is important to not tunnel vision on the negative, but to recognize the good all around us even when the rest of the world is unwilling. Our province and towns have much to be grateful for from the past year, and much to look optimistically towards in the future. As Albertans, facing adversity with confidence has always been in our DNA. The events of the past year have tested us, but they have not broken us. The optimistic, hard-willed, resilient spirit that makes us Albertan will ensure that our best days are most definitely yet to come, as long as we allow ourselves to recognize them when they arrive.

# **DON KOCHAN, COUNCILLOR DIV 2**



A belated Happy New Year everyone!

I hope you were able to stay healthy throughout this lengthy Covid period.

I really appreciate your trust in selecting me to represent you as your area councillor and further to that I have been selected by my colleagues to take on

the role of Mayor. So, as you can see, I do have my work cut out for me as we work through the challenges of managing the business items for the County.

Following is a summary of some of the Council initiatives that I would like you to be aware of:

1. Council directed Administration to update the Springbank ASP. I believe that we have the opportunity to make improvements that will ensure Springbank maintains its strong country residential community along with the required amenities. Administration is preparing to re-engage with residents and I encourage everyone who lives within the ASP area to take an active part in the process. Without your involvement it would be difficult to determine what your vision is regarding the make up of your community. In March, administration will be reaching out to the residents on how they may provide their input into the ASP's review and update.

2. Council is in the process of interviewing candidates for the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) position and we plan to have someone in place before summer. Once the new CAO has been recruited Council will revisit its strategic planning initiatives for the County.

3. The 2022 Budget was passed on January 18. It includes a 4% increase in property taxes which I supported as a reasonable increase to ensure that Rocky View can continue to deliver the services residents and businesses rely upon.

4. Council is interested in knowing what our residents think of their services being provided therefore starting in March all residents would be requested to participate in a customer satisfaction survey to obtain the required feedback that may result in adjusting

services accordingly. More information on how that is to occur will be forthcoming.

5. Administration is working on a communication strategy that will outline the best ways of communicating to residents as well as what should be communicated. The feedback provided in the customer satisfaction survey would assist them in the development of the strategy.

6. SR1 - the province is moving ahead with the Springbank Dry Dam project. The province's current plans include shrub and tree clearing starting in February and continuing through March - mostly east of Hwy 22 and south of Springbank Road and along Hwy 22 just south of Township Road 245.

7. Recreation update - The County is actively working on preliminary planning for a multi-use community facility in south Springbank, as recommended in the Recreation Master Plan. Council established a Task Force that Councillor Hanson and I sit on along with a number of community representatives from Divisions 1 and 2. The County has also hired a consultant to gather information from various community groups to obtain more information on community needs. Stay tuned for further developments on this important initiative.

• Make copies of important documents, pictures, etc.


• When shopping, pick up a couple of the items on your "I need these things" list



# What Is Acupuncture?



Acupuncture is a form of treatment that allows your body to return to its equilibrium. Inserting very fine and thin needles, specific points are chosen based on your diagnosis and treatment plan. If you saw your body as a river system, all water ways connecting to one another, acupuncture points would be the swimming holes.

These are areas in your body where Qi pools and stimulation from an acupuncture needle creates a ripple effect, thereby allowing distal points to be as effective as local points. This is why your acupuncturist will choose points all over your body for a shoulder injury.

Understanding this river (or what we call meridian systems) takes years of training and understanding to know how one ripple will affect both external and internal influences on your body. Examples of this are being treated for shoulder pain, while subsequently also treating any sleep, menstrual,

emotional, or digestive issues. At Springbank Wellness Clinic, Dr. Cindy Dowsett looks at your body as a whole, treating the root cause of your symptoms.

Cindy has her Doctorate of Acupuncture, is a Reiki Master and has a background in Psychology from the University of Calgary. Over the years she has specialized in sports injuries and women's health/fertility. She also treats symptoms such as but not limited to mental health, addictions, insomnia, migraines, and pregnancy. Her husband grew up in Springbank and they have two young children attending our local schools, dance, and hockey associations.

Following the Japanese style of Acupuncture, the insertion of these needles should be painless (noticeable but not uncomfortable). The sensation of Qi has been described as a dull ache, deep pressure, tingling sensation along the meridian, or even a sensation in another area of the body. If pain is ever experienced, the needle can be readjusted or reinserted as the needles are so fine they can fit inside a hair follicle. In fact, 18-20 acupuncture needles fit inside 1 hypodermic needle.

Side effects of acupuncture include relaxation, decreased pain, lowered stress, improved sleep/digestion/emotions, etc. Negative side effects may include bruising and swelling at site and occasional "residual Qi" (a Qi sensation that lasts after the needle is withdrawn). Please tell your acupuncturist if you are sensitive or afraid of needles and special care (and even special needles and/or needle less acupuncture!) can be taken to make you more comfortable.
