2023 will be the year of Alberta. We have already accomplished so much together. Through intentional deregulation, reduced business taxation, and the creation of targeted sector strategies and partnership streams, our government has diversified Alberta's economy,



ersified Albertas economy, ushered in the creation of over 220,000 jobs, and billions of dollars of fresh corporate activity. In fact, Alberta was responsible for 22% of the entire country's total job creation last year which is quite astonishing for a province of only four million people. We are now leading the nation in GDP growth and job creation. We have also been recognized as the fastest growing green

energy market in Canada and the fastest growing tech sector in all of North America. All of this in addition to realizing our best year of oil production on record. The rest of the country has taken notice. In one single quarter 2022, nearly 20,000 other Canadians saw opportunity in Alberta and chose to make this province their new home. We attract such immigration because our province is flourishing. Calculated fiscal restraint and pro-energy policies during the early days of our government's term put our province in a strong fiscal position that allowed us to invest more into healthcare and education than any government in history, advance the largest economy-growing infrastructure investment in history, and offer a targeted \$2.8 billion affordability package for the families most in need in the areas they need it most. Alberta's future has truly never looked brighter. We need to keep it that way.

That is why Premier Danielle Smith and key cabinet ministers recently went to Ottawa to meet with Prime Minister Trudeau and Premiers from across the country to advocate for Alberta's key interests and industries.

Discussions focused on advancing common shared priorities and, perhaps more importantly, on diversions in areas our approaches conflicted. Areas of shared priority for discussion included healthcare transformation, expanded access to addictions treatment, and supports for community care.

Despite increasing Alberta's healthcare funding by nearly \$3 billion in the past three years to its highest level in history, many Albertans have continued to experience strain within the healthcare system in times of desperate need. We recognize reformation is necessary, which is why our government has now begun the important work of transforming many of the processes within the healthcare system. Reforming the management structure of Alberta Health Services to restore local decision making will be one of the first priorities. Fewer managers will mean more frontline staff who can not only ease the strain on our system caused by staffing shortages, but who will be empowered to make decisions in the best interest of their patients. We have also initiated the Alberta Surgical Initiative which will realize an increase in capacity of 80,000 surgeries per year. This will be achieved by expanding chartered surgical clinics' ability to perform publicly funded low-risk surgeries such as hip and knee replacements, allowing public hospitals to focus on more complex surgeries that require hospital space for patients to recover in.

Areas of diversion that we prioritized during meetings with Justin Trudeau were rightfully focused on our energy industry. Premier Smith made it clear that Alberta's expectation is for the federal government to halt the implementation of their Just Transition. According to the Liberals own memo, over 2.7 million Canadian workers in transportation, agriculture, energy, and manufacturing will face job loss or disruption due to this initiative. While the federal government insists the Just Transition is about transitioning these workers into new career paths, we know that most hard-working Albertans do not want or need the government to forcibly transition them into a career path they did not choose. History speaks, and the federal government does not have a strong history of doing this successfully. During their coal transition several years ago, the only support offered to those being forced out of their jobs was Employment Insurance.

Premier Smith also made clear during these meetings that the federal government must halt their ban on electricity from natural gas and their proposed emissions reduction cap - which in more plain words will be production cap given their short timeline to achieve the target. Further, Premier Smith explicitly established that Alberta's expectation will be for any future legislation to abandon any references to Just Transition or the phase out of Canada's energy industry and workforce, and that the plans for the early phase out of natural gas be abandoned given that 90% of Alberta's grid is reliant on natural gas.

In hopes of charting a more positive course forward, an invitation was extended to the federal government to work on a collaborative plan to attract energy investment and workers while reducing Canada's net emissions - recognizing that Alberta's energy and earth mineral sectors have the potential to play a vital role in the country's future and emissions reduction goals.

As we embark into 2023, Alberta does so from a position of economic strength as the fastest growing economy in the country and the most diversified we have ever been. The entrepreneurial, self-determinant Albertan spirit desires nothing more than to live free from government overreach and to give back to our neighbours. Through pro-business policies, low taxation, reduced regulation, and deliberate government initiative to defend our province's interests, our Albertan way of life can and will continue to live on. With your help and support, I know that our province's best days are still on the horizon.

Update February 2/23

2023 Budget - Council passed the 2023 operating budget on December 14th. The budget addresses inflationary needs being faced by the County and includes a potential change of 6% in the municipal tax collected.

Development Plan Municipal (MDP) Terms of Reference (TOR) - Council has passed the TOR for the development of a MDP. The MDP is a statutory plan that outlines the overall vision for a municipality's future growth from a planning and development perspective and guides how and where the municipality will grow. Alberta's Municipal Government Act (MGA), Section 632 requires the council of every municipality to adopt a MDP by bylaw and sets out what an MDP must include. The County's existing MDP (the County Plan), was adopted in October 2013. Rocky View County and other Calgary Metropolitan Region Board (CMRB) member municipalities are required to update their MDP to align with the Calgary Metropolitan Region Growth Plan (RGP) by August 15, 2025. For details on the TOR, please visit RVC's website at www.rockyview.ca. It is expected that the MDP will be completed in 2024.

Springbank Area Structure Plan (ASP) – The Engagement Summary report was released on October 17, 2022, and is available on the County's website. The previous drafts (North ASP and South ASP) have been combined into a single ASP again, and significant revisions have been made to align with the Regional Growth Plan, and to address community feedback and City of Calgary concerns. Administration is completing those adjustments and is aiming to present Council with the final ASPs for consideration by the end of Q2 of 2023, subject to external factors such as intermunicipal collaboration with the City of Calgary and further public engagement on the final draft ASP, the details for which have not yet been finalized.

Costco Application at Bingham Crossing-Administration has been working with Costco on the application and has reviewed the Costco revised submission focusing principally on improvements to the main warehouse store design and the pedestrian connectivity and to determine if the documents align with all policy and technical requirements. Administration has conditionally approved the Development Permit for the construction of a Costco warehouse and ancillary uses, in the Bingham Crossing area of Springbank, Rocky View County.

Edgewood Counseling Centre (Commercial Court) -PRDP20221653 (Counseling Centre) was applied for and refused by Development Authority. The applicant appealed to the SDAB, and the SDAB overturned Development Authorities decision, providing a limited time frame and suggesting a site-specific land use amendment for the use. The applicant re-applied for the Development Permit (PRDP20226012) in an effort to remove the limited time frame. This application was refused by the Development Authority and the applicant again appealed to the SDAB. The SDAB upheld the Development Authorities decision, and the application remains refused for a time extension. As of December 20, 2022, the file manager notes that the application is under appeal by the applicant at the Court of Appeal. Per the SDAB's suggestion during the hearing for PDRP20221653, the applicant has submitted a redesignation application to request a site-specific amendment to include care facility (medical) on the subject lands (PL20220121). This application recently entered the circulation period and adjacent landowners were notified of the application. Resident responses have been received in response. No public hearing date has yet been set. Springbank Community Centre - The Springbank Community Facilities Business Case was presented at the Recreational Governance Committee (RGC) meeting on February first. The business case proposes phases to build multiple recreation amenities that have been identified as a need from the community and groups who would be using the facilities frequently. The amenities are very conceptual and high level in nature. At the RGC meeting, RGC approved Phase 1, the Community Event Centre and to bring a report back with next steps. These next steps would include identifying a project team, capital campaign plan, master site development plans, site servicing quotes and other logistic items to move the project forward. The business case is not intended to identify the final community facility, its purpose is to identify the community need and a concept of what could be built based off of the data. The specifics of the facility are still to be determined with the next steps.

Time line for building of the facility will depend on County capacity and priorities, success of a capital fundraising campaign, and interest within the larger community to take a lead in consort with the County.

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ROCKY VIEW SCHOOLS TRUSTEE JUDI HUNTER



The Board received the Superintendent's report which highlighted the work that has been achieved with the fourth year of the Rock View Division's Four plan.

Safe and Caring Learning Environments

Moving in our fourth year of the 4-year plan, all schools are expected to have an in

school PBIS Team in place, and to be actively engaged in the implementation of the Positive Behaviour and Interventions. To continue to support this work, this year two Learning Support Specialists shifted their work to PBIS Coaches. The coaches work alongside school-based teams and divisional team members to guide implementation of behaviour support plans and support school teams in ongoing assessment of the effectiveness of identified strategies through review, reflection, and data collection. Administration has also increased professional learning options focused on the importance of an aligned approach and response to addressing behaviour, social emotional learning, and mental health. We are confident all schools will be engaged in initial or full PBIS implementation by the end of June 2023.

Making Learning Visible

MyBlueprint continues to roll out across the district. myBlueprint is a Canadian-based online educational planning tool that provides a platform for students to explore and document their academic and vocational interests, eventually creating a step-by-step roadmap to achieve their goals. Tech for Learning specialists and teachers together to discover new ways of engaging students and assisting them to own and share their learning. The Technology for Learning tech team has been engaged in significant distribution of devices to support this work across the district including 975 chromebooks, 100 teacher MacBooks, 50 projectors, and 75 Wi-Fi access points.

Assessment Practices

Schools are sifting to understand how assessment drives instruction through inclusionary practices. Both large scale assessment, and classroom-based assessment practices are at the forefront of conversations via book clubs, professional learning as well as the High School Assessment Working Group. This shift is connected enhanced inclusion, instructional practices, and student engagement.

There has been intentional collaboration of the learning supports, technology for learning, Indigenous learning, and instructional leadership learning specialists to understand each other's roles work and how they can collaborate to provide stronger service to children and classrooms.

New Curriculum

Staff continues with current new curriculum implementation and plans for next phase of implementation in the fall of 2023 which includes ELAL (English Language Arts and Literacy) grades 4-6, Math grades 4-6, Fine Arts K-3, Science K-3, French Immersion Language Arts and Literature K-3.

February is distracted driving month, and with all the connectivity that involves our lives now a days, it takes more effort to make sure that we don't get distracted. A simple thing such as reading a text message, can take your attention away from driving for at least five seconds. How far do you travel when you take your eyes off of the road for five seconds, travelling at 100km/hr? It is roughly the length of a football field, that is crazy when you think about it. Not being fully aware for the length of a football field can bring disastrous results, and change your life and the life of others. Is this really worth it to just text someone or check social media? I don't think so.

Alberta distracted driving law applies to all vehicles as described in the Traffic Safety Act. Even if you are at red

light, you can not do the following: using a hand-held cell phones, texting or emailing, using electronic devices such as laptops, video games, cameras, entering information into a GPS unit, reading, writing, personal grooming. As you see from the exhausted list (which there is more!), you can't do anything that takes your attention away from driving.

One thing that I notice people doing a lot is holding their cell phone like a serving tray, with the phone on speaker phone, talking. This is still distracted driving!

You can be charged with distracted driving if found committing any of the above. The penalty for distracted driving in Alberta is a \$300 fine and 3 demerit points.

While driving, you must keep track of thousands of items, including traffic signals, other motorists and road conditions, which can change quickly here in Alberta! Some tips to minimize distractions can be putting your phone away, and only using your phone when the vehicle is in park. Avoiding emotional conversations with passengers that may lead to distractions. Keeping your hands on the wheel, do not take notes or read while driving. If attending to kids or pets, pull over and deal with it. Finally, a little planning ahead can go a long way. Planning ahead can include setting radio stations before you start driving, and enter information into GPS units before you head out.


