

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COCHRANE RCMP MESSAGE



Who delivers presents to cats? Santa Paws! What did the sea Say to Santa? Nothing! It just waved!

In December 2020, Alberta brought about new Impaired Driving Laws, under the Provincial Administrative Penalties Act. The change made by the Province of Alberta was to modify how impaired drivers are being penalized, by taking them out of the courts, to free up court time and police resources.

The act introduced new immediate roadside penalties, while still getting impaired drivers off the street. For more serious cases, these will receive the same roadside penalties, and still be prosecuted in court. These cases can include repeat offenders, impaired driving causing harm or death. BC has had a similar system in place for a bit, and has proven to deter impaired driving there. Alberta will have some of the toughest impaired driving laws in the country, with these new changes.

Some of the key changes were, new fines up to \$2000, increased length of vehicle seizures up to 30 days for certain offences, increased drivers licence suspensions for repeat offenders, and expanded mandatory ignition interlock for repeat offenders. Commercial drivers and novice drivers will have new zero tolerance consequences as well. All of these changes are to make Alberta roads safer.

Cochrane RCMP is always on the lookout for impaired drivers, but also ask for the publics help in reporting impaired driving. Calling 911 when you see some driving that is out of the ordinary, or you suspect that someone may be driving impaired. You can be impaired by both alcohol and drug, and both carry the same penalties, either provincially or federally.

Hi everyone, the following Division 2 information is for your use:

Council Organizational Meeting
On October 17th Council
had its organizational meeting
and I have been placed on 13
boards and committees. You
may see the appointments to the
different boards and committees
on the counties website. I will

be the Deputy Reeve for this coming year as well as chairing the Subdivision Development Appeal Board (SDAB), Governance Committee, Enforcement Appeal Committee and Vice Chairing the Public Presentation Committee. On the other boards and committees I will be a standing member.

Springbank Area Structure Plan (ASP) – Administration has completed the engagement Summary report and is in the process of modifying the draft ASP to reflect the results. Community feedback was very constructive and helpful for administration on the What We Heard Report, so administration, at the Chair's discretion, has opted to defer the Springbank ASP report to the January 16th Governance Committee to ensure correct statistics and accurate representation. The Draft ASP was to be presented to the Governance Committee on November 21st however with the many changes and to ensure completeness of capturing the community feedback extra time was requested therefore the ASP will be presented in January to the Governance Committee. The website will be updated to reflect this.

Springbank Community Centre - The County has launched a web page South Springbank Community Events Center | Your View (rockyview.ca) on the South Springbank Community facility project that will provides background, timelines and details on how the community can be further engaged in the development of the community centre and future phases. The community centre was identified as a priority due to the displaced renters from the old hall that was decommissioned. There will be a lot more opportunity for the community to be engaged in this project. We are just at the beginning stages and once we move forward with some site studies, we will have a clearer picture of timelines.

Petro – Canada relocation proposal – An Area Structure plan (ASP) and Land Use Redesignation application for the property located at 33019 Township Road 250 (subject property) has been presented to administration. The subject property is located at the southwest corner of Range Road 33 and Township Road 250. The proposed land use application will seek a land use redesignation of the subject property to redesignate the lands from the

current Special, Public District (S-PUB) to the proposed Commercial, Highway District (C-HWY) to permit the future development of an integrated energy centre. The redesignation is being requested to allow for the potential relocation of Petro Canada's existing Jumping Pound integrated energy centre located at the northwest junction of Highway 22 and Highway 1. The potential relocation of Petro Canada's Jumping Pound facility is a result of potential planned improvements by Alberta's Ministry of Transportation and Economic Corridors (ATEC) to the highway interchange at Highway 22 and Highway 1. Petro Canada intends to develop the subject property similar to what exists at the existing Highway 22 and Highway 1 location. These applications are currently within the initial review portion of the application, once the Planner assigned is satisfied the information provided is enough to circulate the files they will have the notices drafted and mailed out to area residents along with a sign being posted on the property to notify area residents of the proposal. Landowners within 1.6km of the subject parcel will be directly mailed a notice. During the circulation the County will be seeking responses from applicable agencies and area residents on the proposal. These comments will then be redacted, where necessary, and shared with the applicant so they can determine how they would like to proceed with their application. Should the applicant wish to proceed to Council without major changes to their application the Planner assigned to the files will draft the Council report and prepare it for internal reviews prior to a Public Hearing date with Council being determined. Should the application proceed through this process a final Council meeting date will be determined and a Public Hearing notice will be sent to the residents within 1.6km of the subject parcel as well as notices posted on the County website. Highway 1 / Range Road 33 Overpass Improvement Stage 1 of Highway 1 and Range Road 33 interchange is required to be completed prior to Costco's opening. Stage 1 consists of a) reconfigure the interchange ramps to a diamond configuration, b) upgrade the interchange ramp terminal intersections to roundabouts, c) widen Range Road 33 to four lanes between Highway 1 and Township Road 250, and d) upgrade the Range Road 33 and Township Road 250 intersection to a roundabout. Nova Scotia education minister says naloxone in schools being discussed for new year



We do have some spots available in both our morning and afternoon classes for the New Year! Check out www.springbankplayschool.ca for more information!



Then recommendations for motions and approvals are moved on to SPFAS 17-18 members strong full Board of Directors (when including the Past President position and the Robinson family who donated the Park's land – representative position).

e.g.

- * Curling Rink slab/refrigeration brine lines replacement project
- * Continued work and liaising with RVC on the South Springbank Community Facilities developmental plans
- * Agricultural Societies Infrastructure Revitalization Program – grant application
- * Reciprocal Use of Facilities Agreement renewal with the Rocky View School Division
- * Long (10-year) Term Capital Plan development (facilities, equipment, ice plant upgrades, etc.)



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
